TRAINING TIP

Annual Pack Program Planning Conference

What Is It? An annual meeting of all pack leaders designed to establish the year's program based on twelve monthly themes and Webelos activity badges, along with special activities, all tailored to the pack's needs.

Why Is It Held? A program planned twelve months in advance allows leaders to look ahead. Advance preparation ensures a well-rounded program of fun, variety, action, and purpose.

Who Attends? The pack committee chairman and Cubmaster are jointly responsible for seeing that this meeting occurs. The meeting is conducted by the pack committee chairman. All den and pack leaders, den chief, Tiger Cub Coaches, and interested parents attend. The unit commissioner also should be invited.

When Is It Held? Each year, in July, or August. This training tip is covered in much more detail in the Cub Scout Leader book which is available for purchase from your Scout shop. In Chapter 7 you will see a wealth of information on why and how to plan this all important conference.

(Walk in place saying, "Jingle, Jingle, Jingle")

THEN HE SITS DOWN TO REST AND CALL IT A DAY!

(Sit down while wiping sweat from brow and saying "Whew -w-w-w!")

GAMES

Cup and Bottle Relay

This is a very wet relay, so play it outside. Form two teams. Place a bucket of water and a cup at the head of each line. At the end of each line is a bottle. Cowboy Obstacle Race

1. Cowboys had to climb around tight places in the mountain. (A long board paced across three bricks.)
2. Cowboys had to be careful when roping their steers. (Tie up a rope for the Cubs to jump over.)
3. At night it was very chilly out on the range. (Stack pieces of firewood for teepee fire.)
4. Branding cattle required a steady hand. (Balance a potato on a spoon and carry it a certain distance.)

Tablecloth Tiddly Winks

Put a red checkered tablecloth on the table. Cubs take turn with six tiddly winks. The object is to see how many land on the red squares. Remove only the ones on the red squares and repeat. Keep going in this manner until all land on the red.

STUNTS AND TRICKS

You Can't Write Tennessee

Players: 1 or more

Equipment: Chair, table, paper and pencil

Tell your friends that you'll give them a pencil and paper, nothing will be done to hamper their hands, they can sit at a table to write, but they still will not be able to write a simple word like Tennessee. Before you let the victims start, let them practice a little foot movement. They must not stop this movement for a second while they are writing. The movement is nothing but a simple circling of one foot under the table. Sit down on a chair and demonstrate the motion. Move your foot clockwise in a circle about as big as a plate. Then let your friend try it. As soon as they are sliding their feet around satisfactorily, have them try to write a designated word. No matter how hard they try they will not be able to write anything but strange -- looking hieroglyphics.

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The secret is that it is difficult to keep two very different motions going at the same time. Your hands want to start making the same movement that your foot is making. However, if you practice you will be able to surprise your friends by writing any word they call out without stopping the motion of your foot for an instant.

Cubmaster: (show two strands of cord in different colors like blue and yellow.) By itself, neither of these strands is very strong. I think a couple of strong Cub Scouts could break either one. Naturalist

Viking Council

The naturalist's world is one to be discovered and investigated. It is as near as a boy's backyard, a nearby park or the woods and fields. It is inhabited by many kinds of insect, birds, plants, animals, trees and other form of life.

The naturalist activity badge may lead a Webelos into a hobby or a vocation through all the exciting, new adventures you plan for your den.

Careers/Speakers

Zoo keeper, conservationist, taxidermist, pet store worker, gardener, museum curator, landscape artist, nature photographer, publisher or writer of nature books.

Den Activities

Invite a Fish and Game Department employee to your meeting. Ask about major problems in the lakes in your area.

Tour the Botanical Garden or an Arboretum. Find out

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how many employees are needed to keep the grounds in good shape.

Visit a zoo with your den families. Arrange a private session with one of the zoo docents.

Contact your county park for bird banding information.

Try to arrange to be present to watch the licensed banders.

Find out about the Mississippi Flyway or other and what birds are common here.

Bird Brush

Use a clean scrub brush for this easy feeder. Melt some bacon grease or lard in a pan, then dip the brush into it. Sprinkle the birdseed mix onto the bristles. As the fat congeals, the seeds will stick. Tie the brush to a tree in a safe spot.

Phenology Calendar

I looked up phenology in Merriam Webster's Dictionary since I wasn't sure exactly what it is :)

Phenology: a branch of science dealing with the relations between climate and periodic biological phenomena (as bird migration or plant flowering)

Buy (or have the Webelos make) blank calendar pages and have the boys write in this month's dates. Have them post it in the kitchen, so it's handy to jot down "things of nature." List one or two things each day: cardinals at the bird feeder, grass turning green, saw the full moon, etc. If the boys enjoy this activity, encourage them to keep a phenology calendar for a whole year. Then they can look back and compare nature's cycles.

Forester

Viking Council

A forester deals with the care and growing of trees. A Webelos working on the Forester activity badge will learn how to recognize different species of trees by their shape, foliage, bark and types of wood. He will learn how they live and grow.

America is a land of trees. Thousands of products come from trees, from rayon clothing to books. One very important value of trees is aesthetic. Think what beauty would be missing without trees.

Careers/Speakers

Forest ranger, greenhouse operator, forester, tree surgeon, forest fire fighter, lumberjack, Fish and Game warden, park ranger, Department of Natural Resources employee, Bonsai club member, Environmental Protection Agency employee.

Activities

Service Project

Ask your local park if your den can plant trees if they provide them. They park will designate where to plant them.

Adopt a Tree

For a long-term project, adopt a tree in the back yard where you meet. Measure its girth, estimate its height if it cannot be measured, record its buds, what color it turns, when it loses its leaves, bird's nest, etc. Keep the information in a diary. Measure it every month.

BSA OUTDOOR CODE

Close your meeting each week by reading the Outdoor Code. Give a short talk on the meaning of each sentence. As an American I will do my best to be clean in my outdoor manners.

Directions

Can you walk a straight line? Nine out of ten people will veer sharply to the right if not focusing on a landmark. Now imagine what that means to a person who becomes lost in the woods.

Mark a line about 50 feet long with a flag at both ends. One at a time, blindfold the boys and have them start at the first flag, pointed in the direction of the second. After walking a given distance, tell them to stop and remove their blindfold.

Boys stand in place, moving slightly if a blindfolded boy is coming near. How many veered to the right? Who was closest to the line?

Field Trip

Arrange a trip to a lumber yard. Talk to the salesman about the different woods available for use. How is wood

treated for gardens, etc. What are the standard sizes of boards and plywood? How does a contractor know how much wood it takes to build a house?

Visit a local nursery or tree farm, or an orchard in production.

Contact a local tree service and ask if you can watch their crew in action. Watch a tree felling or brush clipping operation. Find out about the safety features used.
